THE FIVE FOUNDATIONAL BELIEFS OF THOSE WHO HOLD TO THE 'A.D. 70 THEORY':


- The 2nd Coming of Jesus happened more than 1900 years ago.
- At that same time, Jesus inaugurated the Eternal Kingdom.
- At that same time, the resurrection of all the dead occurred.
- At that same time, the final Judgment took place.
- These events completed, the world then ended.


(It really isn't anything new!)

The first Christians undoubtedly believed themselves to be standing on the verge of a great catastrophe, and we know what intensity and enthusiasm the expectation of the almost immediate coming of the Lord inspired; but if it cannot be shown that Christians now are similarly placed, there would be a want of truth and reality in affecting the eager anticipation and hope of the primitive church. The same event cannot be imminent at two different periods separated by nearly two thousand years. There must, therefore, be some grave misconception on the part of those who maintain that the Christian church of to-day occupies precisely the same relation, and should maintain the same attitude, towards the 'coming of the Lord' as the church in the days of St. Paul.






This means that during the eschaton (end of time), the believers lived in a tension of experienced and anticipated eschatology, between "the already" and "the not yet." They were already in the kingdom of Christ (Col. 1:13), but still waiting for the kingdom of God (1 Cor. 15:24-28).

CONSEQUENCES OF ACCEPTING THE A.D. 70 DOCTRINE

- 1. It cannot be simply a matter of opinion. (Gal. 1:6-9)
- 2. It denies the singular resurrection in the end. (John 5:28, 29)
 - 3. It renders Pentecost irrelevant. (Acts 2; 11:15)
 - 4. It denies all will face Judgment. (Jn. 12:48; 2nd Cor. 5:10)
 - 5. It denies Christ now ruling the kingdom. (Acts 2:29–33)

Says: The 2nd coming of Christ is past, having happened in A.D. 70, and will not occur in the future.

There is no time period between the fall of Jerusalem and the second coming of Christ. They were synchronous events timewise...There is no scriptural basis for extending the second coming of Christ beyond the fall of Jerusalem.

All 2nd coming passages point to the destruction of Jerusalem in A.D. 70

There will not be a return of Christ beyond His 'coming' at the destruction of Jerusalem in A.D. 70 It is absolutely true that Jesus 'came in judgment' upon Jerusalem; this is what the Bible teaches.



BUT THAT DOES NOT PROVE:

- > That this 'coming' was the 2nd coming of Christ.
- That all 2nd coming passages refer to the destruction of Jerusalem.

THE 'COMING' OF JESUS IN SCRIPTURE

- THE BIRTH OF JESUS (Mal. 3:1)
 Representative 'Comings' Of Jesus in Scripture (Not literal)
- When one keeps His word (John 14:23)
- A fellowship through one's obedience (Rev. 3:20)
- In judgment on a local church (Rev. 2:16)

A Conditional 'Coming' Of Jesus in Scripture


• Repentance could prevent His coming (Rev. 2:5, 16)

There definitely was the 'coming' of Jesus in judgment on Jerusalem.

God also promised Israel He would bring them to captivity in another land, and to Egypt in ships.

Deut. 28:36, 68

BUT There is also a future 'coming' of Jesus



IF JESUS HAS ALREADY COME:

"...For as often as you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death <u>till He comes</u>." — 1st Corinthians 11:26

WHY DO WE STILL EAT THE LORD'S SUPPER?

Says: The kingdom of God came with power and glory in A.D. 70, not on the Day of Pentecost (Acts 2)

But the Scriptures teach that the kingdom came with power and glory on the Day of Pentecost! (Acts 2)

Says: The resurrection of the dead came in A.D. 70, and no believer will have a bodily resurrection.

The author sincerely believes that the general resurrection belongs to the same time and event as given the coming of Christ (the destruction of Jerusalem in A.D. 70).

THREE STAGES OF 'RESURRECTION'

- Res. Of Christ & beg. of His Messianic reign
- Dying to the 'old age' and 'rising' of the new
- 'Res.' of each believer at the moment of death

Says: The resurrection of the dead came in A.D. 70, and no believer will have a bodily resurrection.

Resurrection has to be a continuous, ongoing process...What the futurist overlooks is *resurrection is not a one-time event*. Resurrection, like judgment, continues as long as the earth remains and men are born unto women. There was a harvest resurrection in A.D. 70, but we have not yet entered into the process. We will, but not yet.

F WE ARE IN THE RESURRECTION:

"...For in the resurrection they neither marry nor are given in marriage, but are like angels of God in heaven." — Matthew 22:30

WHY DO WE STILL MARRY?

Says: The end of the world & day of judgment came in A.D. 70 and there is no future judgment day.

This was the end of the world, the destruction of the temple, the coming of Christ. This was when heaven and earth passed away.

THE END OF THE WORLD AND FUTUREJUDGMENT_____2nd Peter 3:1-13

"...by the word of God the heavens were of old, and the earth standing out of water and in the water, by which the world that then existed perished, being flooded with water. But the heavens and the earth which are now preserved by the same word, are reserved for fire until the day of judgment and perdition of ungodly men." (vv. 5-7)



THE END OF THE WORLD AND FUTUREJUDGMENT_____2nd Peter 3:1-13

"But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night, in which the heavens will pass away with a great noise, and the elements will melt with fervent heat; both the earth and the works that are in it will be burned up. Therefore, since all these things will be dissolved, what manner of persons ought you to be in holy conduct and godliness, looking for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be dissolved, being on fire, and the elements will melt with fervent heat?" (vv. 10-12)

Why this admonition?
